## 1. FMNP 2011 in Review

Naturalist Program. Although the number of core module course graduates decreased slightly from 947 in 2010 to 941, the total number of program graduates increased by 5.6% (982 in 2010 vs. 1,037 this year) thanks in part to those who completed special topics courses, as well as a larger average class size. Enrollment in special topics courses more than doubled this year with 96 course graduates, up from 35 in 2010. This is certainly a trend that we would like to see continue. While enrollment and course completion grew for the 10th straight year, the number



## Have You Seen Me?!

The University of Florida IFAS Department of Wildlife Ecology and Conservation and the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission have launched a new research project to examine the distribution of fox squirrels in Florida.

The fox squirrel, aptly named for its fox-like tail, is a large squirrel that is approximately twice the size of the common gray squirrel. Fox squirrel coloration is highly variable,

ranging from creamy tan to all black, and many gradations in between. In Florida the fox squirrel can be found in almost every county, however, their
